Looking for quality work from an area native while remaining patient? Then you're the perfect customer for Scott Plueger, owner and sole operator of Plueger Drywall.

After graduating in 1984, Scott farmed with his dad until he took over Darrell Luken's drywall business in 1987 ("It was either take over or be unemployed," he says). He then moved from his parents' house to across the section. He heated his garage and his business has been located there ever since.

More than just a small business owner, Scott is a contributor to the community. He's been a Sunday school teacher and secretary at Christ Lutheran Church. He's also kept cattle for the past 7 years. His family stays connected to the community as well. In 1988, he married Michelle Klemme from Akron. They have a son, Jerrod, who was born in 1990 and will get married June 23. His wedding dance will be in the Brunsville Legion. Their daughter, Nicole, was born in 1992 and is studying occupational therapy at USD. She is Brunsville's Centennial queen.

Scott's clients are located up to an hour away, and most are located in Sioux County. "I've had a lot of luck up there because once you're in, you're in."

Scott doesn't worry about competition. Although he works by himself, he keeps plenty busy. In the past he had t-shirts bearing his business name printed, but Scott doesn't currently advertise. So how do people hear about his business? "Word of mouth," he says.

When asked about cons, Scott replies, "The push. Customers are impatient. They aren't worried about quality as much as when the job will get done." But when asked about pros, Scott replies, "The people."

So if you need some drywall work done, give Scott a call. But be patient. And no pushing.

Providing Hope with Hospice

Janice Renken has the difficult task of comforting terminally ill patients toward the end of their lives. Yet she receives no monetary reward. She is a volunteer for the Hospice of Siouxland and also works as a bereavement volunteer. She has provided care for the past 30 years.

Hospice is an organization of volunteers concerned with the quality of life for the terminally ill and their families. "No one is ever turned away from Hospice care," Janice notes.

When her mother passed away from cancer in August 1978, there were no programs like Hospice. So when Hospice volunteer training was offered at Westmar College, Janice took it. When her sister, Marilyn, fell ill, Janice was her hospice volunteer. Marilyn said of Janice, "There's my angel. She will take care of me."

"I'm honored to be called to be with clients, family and friends," Janice says.

The Hospice of Plymouth County started in a mobile unit south of Floyd Valley Hospital in July 1991. Judy Beverly was their first Hospice nurse. Now they have a small office at Floyd Valley Hospital. The main Hospice office is at 4300 Hamilton Blvd in Sioux City. Linda Todd is executive director and Judy Becker is hospice coordinator. Janice's volunteer is Val Owens, who joined in 2008. "I have learned a lot from Melanie Kruse, one of our hospice nurses," Janice says.

The nurses work closely with the doctors and are immediately available for advice on how to control the pain. They have social workers, counselors, a chaplain, home health care and loyal, devoted volunteers.

Recipe of the Month: Cherry Cheesecake

3/4 c. butter softened

1 1/2 c. sugar divided

2 eggs beaten

1 c. sour cream

2 1/2 c. flour

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. soda

1 can cherry pie filling or strawberry or blueberry

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1/2 c. pecans

Cream butter & 1 c. sugar. Add beaten eggs and sour cream. Add to butter mixture. Stir in flour, salt & soda. Combine well. Spread 1/2 of batter in greased 9x13 pan. Spread pie filling over batter evenly. Drop & spread remaining batter on top of filling & sprinkle with remaining sugar & cinnamon. Garnish with pecans. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes or until done. If desired, drizzle baked coffeeecake with 1 1/2 c. powdered sugar, 1/4 tsp vanilla and 3 T. warm water.

Of her work, Janice says, "It's compassionate, comforting touch with gentle assistance to help families cope by wiping a tear or two, holding their hands, and showing God's love in word and deed, revealing His heart in time of great need." She feels her work shows God's love and how special people are. She receives great personal rewards from patients' families by just holding a hand or seeing them smile. She also finds reward in the lasting friendships with the patients' families. "I've received many letters and phone calls from the families for the care and compassion for their loved ones," she adds.

In 2003 Janice was awarded Iowa Hospice Organization Volunteer of the Year at the Iowa State Center in Ames. She was recognized for her outstanding commitment that assured success of Hospice caring. "It's an inspiration to provide Hospice care to anyone who needs it. It's hard to see your loved ones suffer and we want to give them quality of life," she notes.

In 2009 Hospice of Siouxland dedicated the Bouquet of Hope Garden, located on the south edge of Le Mars at 18th St. and 6th Ave S.W. Flowers from the garden are given to Hospice patients. Eugene Kruse offered the plot of land.

At Christmastime Janice serves as entertainment coordinator for Pioneer Village, where each loved one is honored with a Christmas tree ornament. She is also actively involved with St. Peter Lutheran Church, Good Samaritan Care Center, LCHS alumni, Four Seasons Garden Club, and the annual Art Pahl Accordion Fest.

"My family is very important to me," she says. This June Janice and her husband, Bill, will celebrate their 50th anniversary with family and friends at Brunsville Legion Hall.

Dodge City's Boot Hill

Dodge City's Boot Hill was started in 1872 as a convenience to saloon and parlor operators on Front Street. The hill was a high point for that part of Kansas, rising seventy-odd feet above Front Street to the northwest, when no part of town was out in that direction. Graves were shallow and shabby, often unmarked because the occupants were unknown. The deceased were as likely to be buffalo hunters as gunfighters, and they died from starvation, freezing, epidemic and the more notorious "lead poisoning" from a shootout on Front Street. Some gunfighters were buried there, including some victims of Wyatt Earp's pistols, but never as many as Hollywood would have us think.
