Great Granddaughter of Mary Bruns Shares Family History

Following are some notes from Eileen Sommer, great granddaughter of Johan "John" and Mary Bruns:

It is my understanding that John and Mary Bruns moved to Iowa in 1901. They apparently farmed 320 acres of land and lived east of what is now the golf course, where the Oetken family has resided these past years.

John and Mary had eight children. The three oldest daughters, Emma, Martha and Johana, may not have moved to Iowa. They were over 18 years old. The other children were my grandfather, John Frederick "Fred" (age 14), William "Bill" (age 9), Louis (age 7) and Ethel (age 4). Their youngest daughter, Marie, was born in 1904, a month after John died of pneumonia at the age of 52.

In 1909, Mary sold 80 acres of the farmland, so that the town could be built. Brunsville was named in her honor.

In the 1930s when devastating natural disasters and the depression were happening, she lost her remaining 240 acres of the farmland. As a widow, she had kept the land for nearly 30 years. Mary died in 1944, at the age of 87.

Bill and Hannah Bruns farmed at Brunsville and raised two sons, William and John. Then William and Betty Bruns raised their four children, Mary William, Nancy and Phil, in Brunsville until 1972, when they moved to Minnesota. They were the last of the Bruns family to live in Brunsville.

I don't know when the other Bruns children moved on, except for my grandparents, Fred and Emma Bruns. They lived in Johnson Township for a year. In 1915 they moved to Minnesota to farm.

Louis and Anneka "Carrie" Bruns had two children, Lucille and Elsner. They lived in Le Mars, Iowa, when I knew them.

Ethel (Brunsville) and Henry Dirks moved to Texas.

Marie (Brunsville) and William Dirks moved to Akron, Iowa, and later to Colorado.

The oldest daughter, Emma (husband John Becker) died at the birth of her 10th child, in 1921, at the age of 44. Mary Bruns raised this child until he was six.

Martha and Dick Mulder lived in Montana.

Johana and William Mammen may have lived in California. That is where their daughter lived.

Mary seems to have been a very strong woman. It is an honor to have a town named after her.

My grandparents, Fred and Emma Bruns, are buried in the Le Mars cemetery.

Emma died of tuberculosis in 1925 at the age of 30, leaving behind four young boys. Fred continued to farm in Minnesota, remarried and had two daughters. He died in 1948. I was a year old so I did not get to know these two grandparents. My family would visit the Brunsville area at times, so there is a special place in my heart for the area. In Brunsville, Bill and Hannah were always happy to see their nephew and his family.

Recipe of the Month: CARMEL APPLE COOKIES

1/2 cup shortening	1 tsp. ground cloves
1-1/3 cup brown sugar, firmly packed	1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
1 egg	1 cup grated peeled apples
2-1/4 cup sifted flour	1 cup light raisins
1 tsp. baking soda	1/2 cup apple juice
1/2 tsp. salt	1 cup chopped walnuts
1 tsp ground cinnamon	

Cream shortening, sugar & egg until light & fluffy. Sift together dry ingredients & add to creamed mixture. When well blended, stir in remaining ingredients, except icing.

Drop by level tablespoonfuls 3" apart onto greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 12 minutes, or until lightly browned. Remove cookies and cool on racks. When cool, spread with Carmel Icing. Makes about 4 dozen.

CARMEL ICING:

Combine 1/4 cup butter & 1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, in saucepan; cook until sugar dissolves, about 3 minutes. Add 1-1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar, 1/4 tsp. salt & 2-1/2 Tbsp. dairy half-and-half or light cream; beat until smooth. (If frosting becomes too thick when spreading on cookies, thin it by adding a little more cream.)

Alan Wilken, Peggy and Elmer Wilken's oldest son, shares his experience on this year's RAGBRAI. Alan graduated from Le Mars Community High School in 1972, works in Missouri City, TX and visits Brunsville a few days each year. The following is his account of the latest trip to his hometown.

This was my second RAGBRAI. My son, Steven, and I arrived in Brunsville from Missouri City, Texas (suburb of Houston) Wednesday, July 17th and visited my mother Peggy Wilken and brother Keith's family from Le Mars for a couple of days before heading south to Council Bluffs. We rode the whole week July 21 through July 27 from the Missouri River at Council Bluffs to the Mississippi River at Fort Madison. The second day, Monday, we completed the Karras loop which is an additional loop added to the days ride to push the distance past the century mark. In this case, the mileage was 110 miles. We actually ate breakfast twice in the same town as well as endured 95 degree heat and an Iowa thunderstorm with small hail that evening. The big disappointment for the day was missing our shower due to lightning. The following afternoon we took the opportunity to visit my brother-in-law in Des Moines. I didn't keep track of the number of pieces of pie, gallons of Gatorade or the amount of ice cream I personally consumed on the ride but the number and amount was significant. No Lance Armstrong sightings to report on Sunday, Monday or Tuesday. I guess he couldn't keep up. The last day the weather was wonderful for riding. The day started out at a cool 53 degrees and warmed to a high temperature of 73 degrees. It felt like we were flying the last 62 miles. We started at 6:15AM in Fairfield and arrived at Fort Madison before noon with a couple of hours in the middle spent taking pictures, chatting, eating snacks and eating lunch in the pass through towns. Steven and I made it safe and sound with no injuries during the week.
